The health department is on high alert after the death of two sisters at Gyanpur Magola village in Allahaganj block of Shahjahanpur district on Saturday. Kumari Shivani, 10, was admitted to the district hospital on Saturday morning with the complaint of continuous vomiting and her body was not responding to medicines. Doctors suspected that she was suffering from "chronic diarrhoea", but before they could do much, she died. Before Shivani's kin could reach home with her body, the news of the death of her younger sister Chotti, 6, arrived. Chotti was suffering from the same disease and family members had taken her to a community health centre. After deaths, chief medical officer RP Rawat rushed a team comprising doctors and other medical staff to the village on Sunday to examine children and to ensure that they are protected against vector-borne diseases. The CMO told TOI, "Two dedicated health teams are visiting affected villages on regular basis. Apart from check-ups and medicine distribution, we are educating villagers about healthy eating and drinking habits."

In August, 13 children died of diphtheria in Manorathpur village of Shahjahanpur. Health department officials put onus of these deaths on "incomplete vaccination".
